Why I Give: Honoring a Moving SRJC Experience



David Del Monte's connection to SRJC began over 50 years ago in 1961 when David enrolled as a student at SRJC. David studied business courses while being actively involved in campus life. In addition to attending classes he worked for the Press Democrat Circulation Department and for two years, led the the publicity committee that represented the student body.

David and his wife Dede recently made an important decision that will influence the futures of countless SRJC students to come. The couple chose to contribute real estate and equity holdings through a charitable remainder unitrust (CRUT) in support of the Dede and David Del Monte Lectureship Endowment.

The endowment funds a diversity-focused lecture series that David established in 2000. With this gift, Dede and

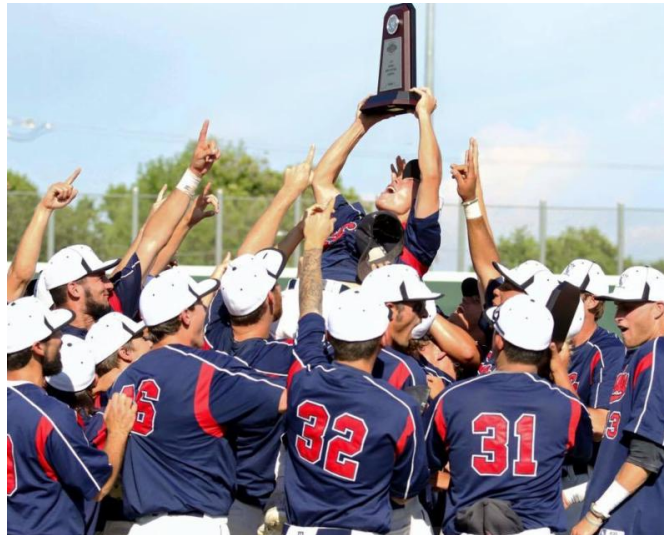
David hope that the annual event will continue to shape minds and hearts through important conversations centered in diversity, and that the speakers will continue to have a transformative impact on future generations of SRJC students.

Always humble, David and Dede say that the gift is truly a "win-win" for SRJC and for them. Although the gift was made with charitable intent, it also serves a practical purpose - the CRUT allows them a charitable income tax deduction and an annual lifetime income during retirement. David said, "We appreciate that our support will reach wider than an individual scholarship, and that it allows us to leave a legacy to be proud of. My SRJC experience had a profound impact on me, so there is emotional ownership in our gift. I know firsthand what a valuable asset the College is, and I'm proud to be a part of that."

Professor Profile: Joel Neuberg, Forestry, Ag and Natural Resources Instructor



From student to instructor, Joel Neuberg has come full circle.

In 1971, he arrived at SRJC to take Forestry classes, having already completed a bachelor's degree at UC Berkeley, most of a master's degree from San Francisco State University and nearly three years' experience

working in agricultural cooperatives in Africa and Israel.

As Joel says, "I learned more from SRJC Forestry instructor David N. Turner in the next two years than in my previous decade of education." By 1973, Joel had started teaching a course in the department where he continued to teach classes for 40 years.

In recognizing Dave Turner's impact on him, one has to also recognize how Joel has paid it forward to the next generation of SRJC students. Joel's students have gone to become park rangers, work for outdoor activity organizations, or become conservationists. Recently, at his quasi-retirement dinner, Joel's former students showed up to thank him. "It's a great feeling to realize you've been able to impact someone's career and life."
